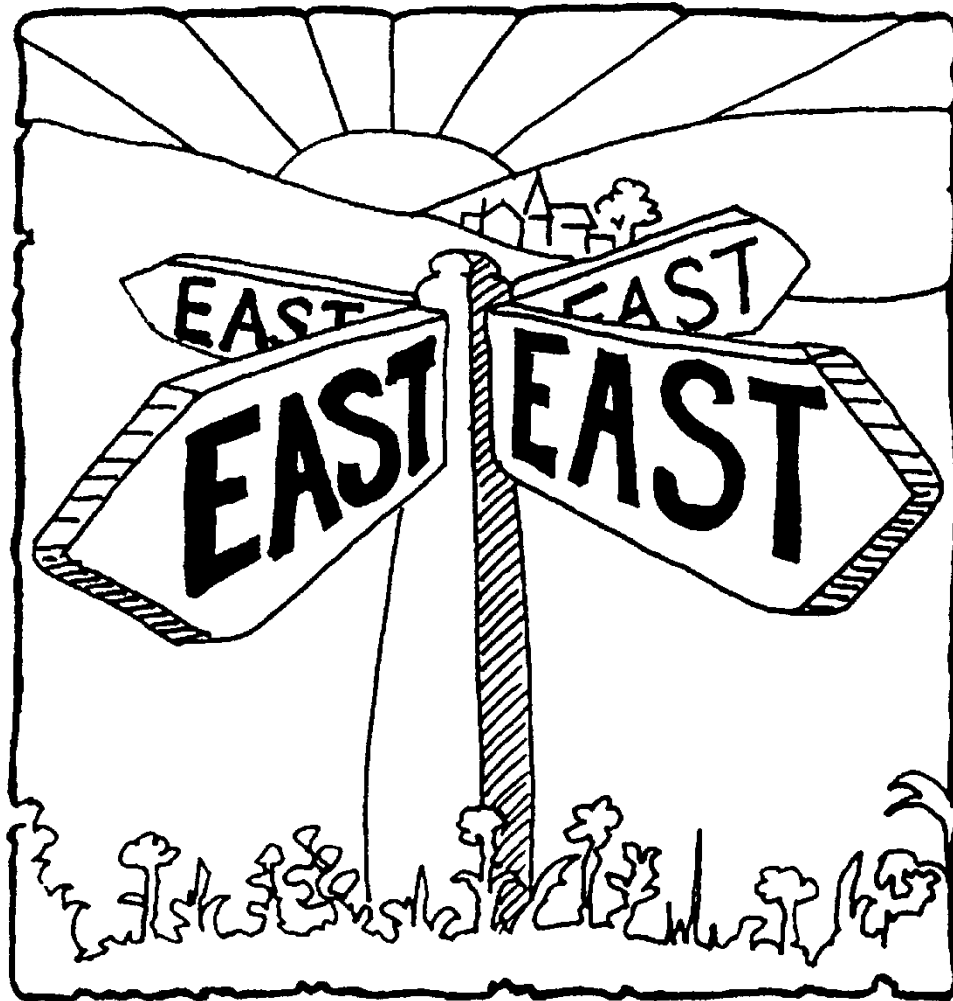

Happy 100th Birthday, Jean!!

In Issue 47 of Points East, the family tree of Samuel East (1827-1899) and Ann Foster (1834-1897) was featured, showing four generations, including member Jean Lloyd ('Jean Lillian East 1920-'). In recognition of her 100th birthday, the committee has awarded Jean an **Honorary Life Membership** of the East FHS.

Jean Lillian East was born in October 1920 to parents Charles and Eliza East. Charles and Eliza were married at the Parish Church of All Saints in South Lambeth, London on 16th March 1919. Jean was born the following year, actually named Eliza; the eldest child with later six siblings (one sister and five brothers).

Her father Charles was born on 8th April 1887 to Charles East (senior) of Southwark and Caroline Foster of Clapham, London. Both Samuel and his father William were chairmakers and by 1850 when he married his first wife Louisa, Samuel was already working as a chairmaker and living in Paradise Street in Lambeth, London. After his wife's death in 1851, he married second wife Ann in October 1853.

1940: Civilian War Dead Remembered

This year sees the anniversary of the Battle of Britain and the subsequent “Blitz” on targets extremely close to densely populated areas.

It is estimated that approximately 23,000 British civilians died during the Battle of Britain (July to October 1940) and over 40,000 civilians were killed in the Blitz over London (September 1940 to May 1941).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission has assembled a collection of cemetery and memorial registers for civilian war deaths during World War 2.

Three East names are recorded for 1940:

Herbert Henry East d. 16/8/1940

Joseph East d. 9/9/1940

Frederick Edward East d. 25/9/1940

Herbert Henry East would have died as a result of an air raid during the Battle of Britain. I can find no information other than he lived in Strood, Kent.

Joseph East died during the early part of the Blitz. The Germans had accidentally bombed some civilian areas in August 1949 and Britain had retaliated by bombing civilian areas in Berlin. Germany continued to bomb strategic areas close to civilian homes. Joseph lived in Shoreditch; in 1939 registers he is recorded as “incapacitated” and living with his wife Ellen. Joseph died in St. Leonard’s hospital, Shoreditch.

Frederick Edward East worked at the British Aeroplane Works in Filton, Bristol. Frederick is mentioned in Issue 36 of Points East (Autumn 2010). On the 70th anniversary of the Battle of Britain, there had been a television programme about the bombing of Bristol during World War 2. One of our members had noticed a plaque on which Frederick’s name appeared. From some information on Ancestry, I discovered that Frederick had been an air raid patrol warden and was ensuring that employees got to the air raid shelters when the bombs fell. The raid on 25/8 was one of the first to take place during daylight hours and one of the bombs fell between two shelters. According to the Western Daily Press of 26/9/40 the Air Ministry recorded that “enemy aircraft crossed the Dorset coast today and attacked Bristol, causing some damage and killing a number of people”. The bombing raid took 45 seconds and killed 92 of the British Aeroplane Company’s employees.

There is a plaque within St. Peter’s Church, Filton, which commemorates those who lost their lives during the raid.

John East is a trustee of Darwen Heritage Centre and gave the presentation to commemorate VJ Day 2020.

John Jellicoe Kitchener East was born in 1916. He was a POW in Thailand and worked on the infamous Railway of Death and then was liberated in Hiroshima, Japan after the dropping of the Atom Bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki. He survived and after several health issues, married his Blackburn sweetheart Betty after three and a half years. He settled in Darwen in 1958 – a cruel journey of attrition, starvation, humiliation and survival but with a love story attached.

John says 'Please circulate widely on Facebook and other social media you feel appropriate.'

Ann East transported to Australia 1791

From the Archives :

During the COVID “lockdown”, I began to scan the remains of the paper files and have often been distracted by the contents of some of the articles.

So, I came across a biography of Sophia Charlotte East (c1797 – 1834) and noticed that the article, in full, had been published in Points East Number 5.

Sophia had been born in Sydney, New South Wales. Both of her parents had been transported to Australia and she nearly got transported to Norfolk Island Penal Colony for having 44 government-issue blankets in her possession. However, she was pardoned for the crime and subsequently inherited 50 acres of land in Parramatta.

What interested me about the article was the reference to the “Third Fleet” and was intrigued to find out more about it and also about Sophia’s mother, Ann East, who arrived on the “Mary Ann”, the first ship of the Third Fleet to reach Sydney.

The “Mary Ann” was part of a flotilla of 11 ships bound for the Sydney Penal Colony taking vital supplies to the colony and taking about 2000 convicts. It had been built in 1772 in France as a whaler and captured by the British in 1778. It was the first of the ships to arrive in Sydney, the voyage taking 143 days. There were 150 female convicts aboard and it was reckoned that they were reasonably cared for as the death toll during the journey was small.

Ann East was 17 years old when she was convicted of receiving stolen goods (two gallons and a half of brandy, two gallons of peppermint, two gallons of raspberry, one gallon and a half of aniseed). Her husband, James (aged 28 years) was hanged for his part in the burglary. Ann was sentenced to 14 years transportation to Australia. This was an unusually long sentence for such a crime. When she got to Sydney, she would probably have been assigned as a domestic servant or a farm labourer.

At the time of Ann’s arrival in Sydney, she was one of less than 500 women in the colony. She formed a relationship with a convict, John Owen, who had arrived on the First Fleet in 1787, and they had three children (John b.1792, Thomas b. 1794 and Sophia Charlotte b. 1795). Whether they remained together and what happened to Ann is unclear. Sophia was assumed to be an orphan when she married her husband, Mr. Smithers.

Deaths of Caroline and Ann Eliza

Coincidence?

When I was checking a new family tree that had been sent to EFHS, I was intrigued to notice that two family members had been buried on the same day. Sitting in “lockdown” during the COVID-19 pandemic. It is easy to speculate that some epidemic might have been raging during 1870. Certainly, cholera outbreaks and smallpox outbreaks did occur during the 19th century but I could find no specific information about a specific outbreak. We do not have the death certificates of either of these ladies. From the British Newspaper Archives, we know that one of the ladies had been ill for a long time and the other was 82 years so I think that the fact that they died within a day of each other was purely coincidental.

So, who were these two ladies? The first was Dame Caroline Eliza East, the wife of Sir James Buller East, 2nd Baronet of Calcutta. Sir James was a barrister and one-time Member of Parliament for Winchester. Dame Caroline died on the evening of 7th April 1870 aged 75. The Oxford Journal of 16th April gave her a glowing obituary adding that “her death will be deeply felt by the poor of Bourton and its neighbourhood by whom she was ever a generous benefactress and a kind sympathizing friend”.

The second Lady was Dame Caroline’s sister-in-law, Ann Eliza Croft (nee East) who died in the early hours of the morning of 8th April 1870 after “a short illness”. Both ladies were residing at Bourton House and were buried together.

James Thomas East (1860 to 1937) *by Pam Pearce*

Poet, Hymn writer and Wesleyan Methodist minister.

Ken, my husband is a church organist, and in his research through various Hymn books looking for suitable hymns, he came across a Christmas hymn by James Thomas East. The first verse begins; “Wise men, seeking Jesus, Travelled from afar, Guided on their journey by a beauteous star.”

The East name caught my eye, so I decided to find out more about him. James Thomas was born on January 28th 1860 in Finedon, a village just outside Kettering, into a humble family, the eldest of 7 children. His father, Thomas East was a “labourer in iron” in 1871, and Thomas’ father - also Thomas - was a “road labourer” in 1851. In 1841 they were agricultural labourers.

The Kettering connection also caught my eye and I wondered if he belonged to a branch of the family of the artist Alfred East. I believe, as a result of the research, that he probably doesn’t, but there may be remote connections, which can probably be proved by our Research Manager.

In the book, “Directory of Past Methodist Ministers” that Ken owns, James is shown as having had charge of a number of Methodist Churches around the country, serving even in Scotland, in the parish of Kelvin in Glasgow in the 1880’s and 90’s. [The Directory shows several more East Methodist Ministers, which might be interesting to follow up.]

He married Mary Taylor in Kettering on Christmas day 1881, and they had five children, of whom the first two died in early childhood. [from the 1911 census]

In 1881, before he married in December that year, aged 21, James was working as a tailor’s cutter, and was already known in the Methodist Ministry as a “Wesleyan Local Preacher.” James’ brothers worked in the shoe trade, both in leather, and, in the various stages of the making of shoes. His brother William was a leather currier. His brother George was a shoe riveter, and, another brother, Joseph, was a shoe clicker. Having researched the family back to the late 1700’s, in the earlier generations they appear to be people of the soil, agricultural labourers, building a living in farming and horticulture to keep their families fed and clothed.

James Thomas East died on 28th May 1937, in Blackburn, Lancashire, where he is buried, a very well-off man, leaving over a thousand pounds in his will to his wife Mary [nee Taylor], and a daughter Marjorie, [Kathleen Marjorie Griffiths, widow]. This was a considerable sum in 1937.

It would be really interesting to know if any of our members are descended from this family.

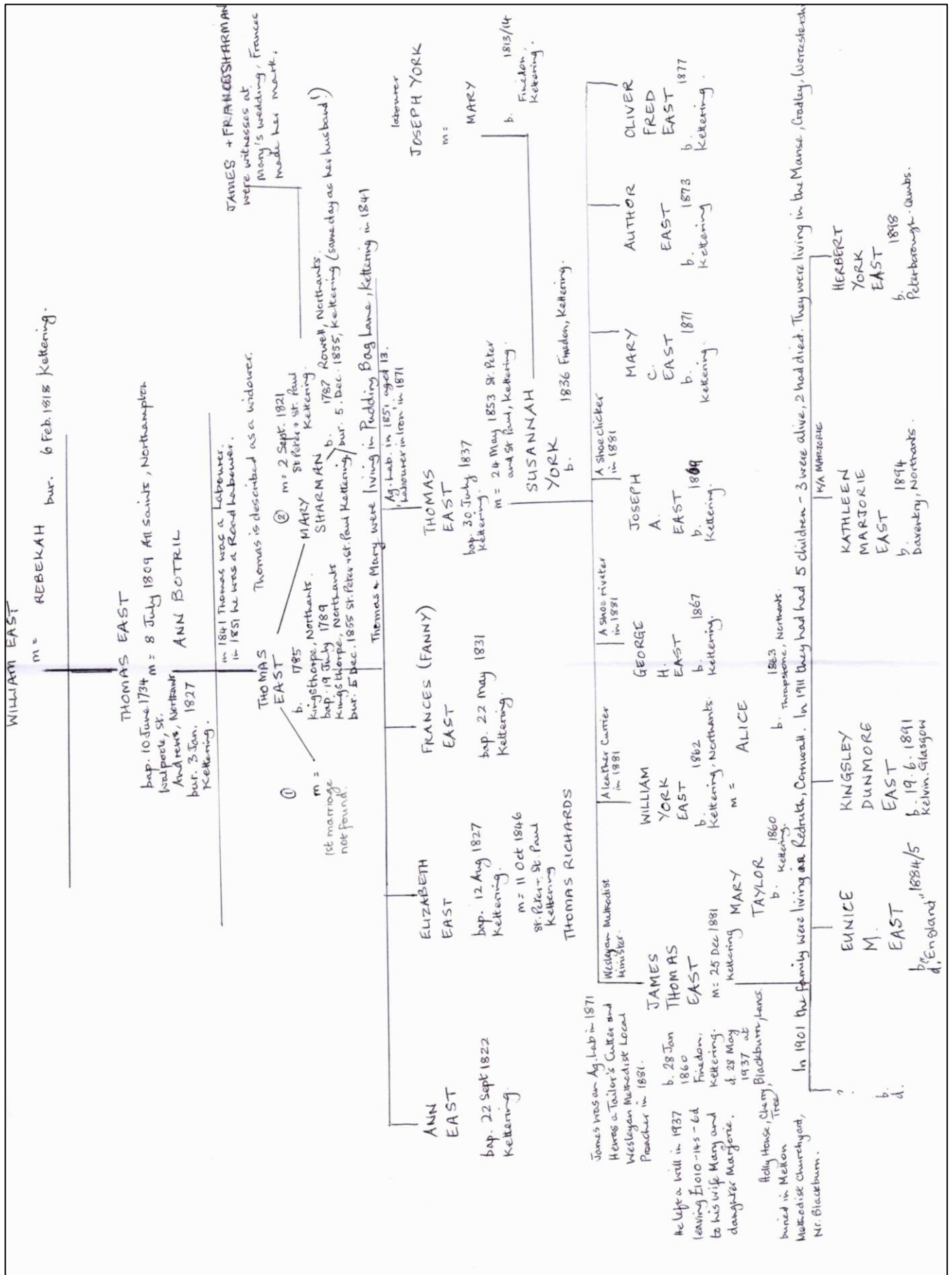

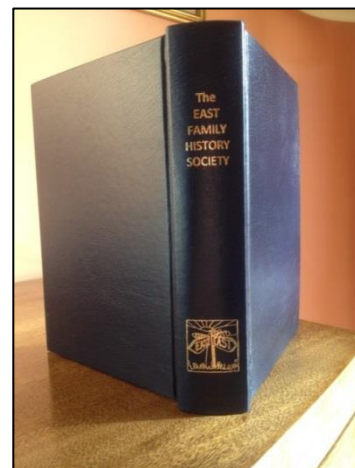

Source Data

The Society's Research Manager holds the following data. Much of it is on computer and all of it is available, on request, to members for their personal use.

- GRO index of all EAST births from 1837 to 2005; marriages from 1837 to 2005 and deaths from 1837 to 2006. The index is regularly updated with new information. The index has been sent by email to all members and will be sent to new members when they join.
- On computer over 18,100 baptism, marriage and burial Parish records. These are taken from actual records, transcripts or indexes. Many are not on the IGI.
- On computer over 2,400 probate records extracted from the National Calendar from 1858 to 1967, together with some earlier probate records. These give exact dates, names and places of death, and sometimes additional information such as names of executors. We have paper or digital copies of over 100 EAST wills.
- A growing collection of over 2,800 birth, marriage and death certificates. A note of the certificates held is made on the GRO indexes. A list is available on the website.
- On computer, using 'Family Tree Maker', a large collection of EAST family trees with over 12,000 individuals and more than 135 trees.
- A genealogical index, in book form, of all mentions of the EAST surname from the first 14 issues of Points East, together with a separate index of other surnames. An index on computer of all mentions of the EAST surname in issues 1 to 39 of Points EAST. All the indexes are available on the website
- On computer, Civil registration indexes for EASTs in New Zealand (1840 to 1990) and Western Australia (1841 to 1905)
- An extensive collection of non-digitised information, documents etc contained within 'County' and 'Correspondence' files. This is partially indexed on cards and a computer index of all 'Miscellaneous Data' is continually updated.
- The UK National Burial Index (3rd Edition)
